The Goal of Title I is to improve student achievement through...

1. Effective Instruction
2. Professional Development
3. Parent Engagement

Title I

Parent and Family Engagement

The Title I program for parents is designed to:

- 1) inform parents about Title I regulations
- 2) involve parents in local Title I decisions
- 3) provide literacy training and
- 5) encourage active participation in their children's schools and education.

Public Law 114-95 requires:

- All Title I schools to develop jointly, with parents of participating children, a Parent and Family Engagement Plan and a parent-student-teacher compact (written agreement) that states what parents, students and the school will do together to raise student achievement.
- Schools to sponsor an annual meeting for all Title I parents and engage parents in an "organized, ongoing and timely way" in the planning, review and improvement of Title I schools.
- Each Title I school utilize a percentage of its Title I allocation to support a comprehensive parent and family engagement program. (The School Advisory Council provides input in determining how Title I funds are used).

Hillsborough County Public Schools Title I Parent and Family Engagement Plan

The School Board believes that engaging parents in the education process is essential to improved academic success for students. It further recognizes that a student's education is a responsibility shared by the school and the family throughout the student's career in the district. Therefore, the School Board shall foster and support active parent involvement so that schools and parents work together as partners in educating children as reflected in the Family and School Partnership for Student Achievement Act and the requirements for parental involvement included within section 1118 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

TITLE I SCHOOLWIDE Projects

Where we came from...

Title I is the largest program of state funding in education, signed into law in 1965 by President Lyndon Johnson. President Johnson recognized the extremely difficult problem that children throughout the country were having with their reading and mathematics.

In an effort to enhance student achievement, extra resources, materials and teachers are provided by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title I (ESEA). On December 2015, President Obama signed into law the Every Student Succeeds Act formerly known as No Child Left Behind (2001).

Where we are...

The Title I law requires the meaningful involvement of parents in school level planning, development and design of initiatives to improve student achievement supported by Title I funds.

The purpose of the Title I school-wide program is to assist schools in improving student achievement, staff development and parental engagement. Title I funds enhance the regular district instructional program.

Title I funds may be used to:

- add highly effective teachers
- support community and parent & family engagement efforts
- improve staff development
- purchase additional instructional materials and supplies
- add technology and needed equipment
